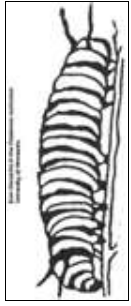
#8752 Project WILD - Aquatic

#8710 Visual Phonics (An Intervention Strategy)

See the Sound/Visual Phonics (VP) is a multisensory system that represents the sounds of English in a concrete and visible way, providing a multi-model way for students to map sound-to-print. VP aligns well with brain-based learning and instruction, and has proven to be an exciting and effective method of establishing the Alphabetic Principle and teaching phonological, phonemic and phonics skills necessary for success in reading, spelling & writing. Since VP is an intervention strategy (not a program), it can be used as both a universal or targeted intervention with the RTI process, and is regularly used in General Education classrooms, preschool settings, elementary and secondary Special Education programs, ELL programs, classrooms and itinerant services for Deaf & Hard of Hearing, and adult literacy programs. VP is also an effective tool for helping students with speech disorders to develop/modify speech sound productions and auditory discrimination skills, beginning as early as age 3. Participants will learn the VP system and appropriate uses of VP with students in various settings and varying needs. **Registration fee includes the cost of Visual Phonics materials. You may elect to take this course for 1 grad credit for an additional cost of \$100 due the first day of class.**
